
# **Return to Wigmore**









The Samling Foundation's year ends with a return to one of the world's leading recital venues, Wigmore Hall, in London, on Friday December 14th to showcase its work in the capital. It is the first annual concert planned over the next three years as part of Wigmore's series.

Over and members of Southbank Sinfonia. The evening, which will include works by Brahms, Vaughan

Williams, Ravel and Puccini, will celebrate the charity's work with exceptional young international singers through its masterclass programme.

# What a triumph!

Two years after Così fan tutte, Samling Opera's 'keenlyanticipated' second opera production - Don Giovanni - took to the stage at The Sage Gateshead for three shows and one special free schools' performance supported by The Gillian Dickinson Trust. At The Sage Gateshead, a leaner, meaner version was directed by a great Don Giovanni of the previous generation, Sir Thomas Allen. Using only the concert platform, simple costuming and some lighting effects, Allen's lucid, uncluttered staging hit the heart of the matter.
