Song has always been at the heart of everything we do at Samling Institute. It demands supreme artistry and can speak intimately to audiences.

This year we are launching Samling and Song, an innovative project which will offer Samling Artist singer and pianist duos mentored residencies. This new scheme deepens our commitment to art-song and widens the career development that we are able to offer to early-career artists following completion of the Samling Artist Programme. In November, one of the world's greatest mezzo-sopranos, Dame Sarah Connolly, will join us for the first time to lead the **Samling Artist Programme** at Marchmont House. French conductor Paul-Emmanuel Thomas, who conducted our February 2019 Italian Opera Gala with Royal Northern Sinfonia, also leads the programme for the first time, and we welcome back Samling Artist pianist Joseph Middleton and actor lames Garnon.

You'll be able to watch the team working with our eight new Samling Artists and sharing their insights into song and opera in a public masterclass at Marchmont House on the afternoon of Saturday 3 December. The line-up of singers and pianists who have been offered places on this programme and for March 2023 will be announced following live auditions in London and Glasgow in September.

Continuing the opportunities we offer to emerging artists, soprano Madison Nonoa will make her Wigmore Hall debut in our **Samling Artist Showcase** on Wednesday 9 November, alongside mezzo-soprano Angharad Lyddon, tenor Nick Pritchard, baritone Julien Van Mellaerts and pianists Jonathan Ware and Kunal Lahiry. They'll be performing the programme of seathemed song cycles that was originally planned for November 2020, including Elgar's *Sea Pictures*.

Samling Academy, our training programme for singers from schools and universities in the North East, returns in October when we welcome thirty singers

who were awarded places following auditions in March. We're particularly pleased that the proportion of singers from state schools continues to increase, reflecting on the success of our Samling Futures programme through which we introduce young people to classical music and share with them the opportunities and pathways we offer through the Academy.

Acclaimed soprano Joan Rodgers CBE joins the Academy leadership team again for six days of masterclasses and workshops. We also welcome for the first time actor James Cooney and Samling Artist bass-baritone Andri Björn Róbertsson who will be working with our Academy Singers on stagecraft, exploration of text and meaning and being honest and true to oneself in performance.

An afternoon concert at Sage Gateshead on Sunday 23 October will showcase the work that has been achieved and early booking is recommended as this event is always very popular.

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WHY SAMLING INSTITUTE?

Mezzo-soprano Dame Sarah Connolly grew up in County Durham and studied piano and singing at the Royal College of Music. Her broad repertoire encompasses everything from Handel's heroic 'trouser roles' to Mahler symphonies, French song and a commitment to promoting new music. She has appeared in the world's greatest opera houses and gave a memorable performance at Last Night of the Proms dressed as Lord Nelson. Her most recent recording is the Complete Songs of Duparc, with pianist Malcolm Martineau (alongside Samling Artists Nicky Spence and William Thomas).

My earliest musical memory ...
My parents took me to Darlington Civic
theatre when I was about 6 years old to
hear 'The Magic Flute'. I just remember the
excitement, the drama – the huge snake, and
orchestra and voices sounding so near and
fresh. Dad played a lot of classical records at
home but hearing it live was mind blowing.

The most recent live performance I saw was ...

'Rigoletto' at The Met opera. I wasn't bowled over I must say but the soprano Erin Morley sang and acted so beautifully as Gilda and coped very well with a stage exit door with no handle!

My three essential travel items are... Earl Grey tea leaves (and strainer), my iPhone and Olaplex hair conditioner.

My favourite place in North East England is ...

Whitby and Sandsend. Almost every childhood summer holiday was spent on the freezing beach braving the numbingly cold sea. Getting a stick of rock in Whitby was our treat and walking around the town which was always so bustling and noisy with life. We enjoyed the fairground rides and I usually got a wasp in my candy floss!

A song composer more people should discover is ...

Clara Schumann. She only wrote a few songs by comparison to her husband Robert but she was a really gifted melodist with her own style of piano accompaniments (being a supremely gifted concert pianist).

The opera character I most admire is ... Wagner's Brünnhilde. She embodies some of the best virtues; strength, honesty, empathy, bravery and tenderness.

When I have time off, I like to ... cycle through villages (though not if it's too hilly), mess about on the beach and sea, cook and drink wine with friends, a spot of gardening, reading and playing the piano.

My advice to young singers is ... work hard at your technique, listen to lots of recordings to discover what you like, study languages and find the music YOU love to sing. If your teacher hands you an aria that after a month you hate, find something that you like instead. We need to interpret the music and the character and that's just not possible if there's no fondness or connection.

The intimacy of song demands supreme artistry, soul-searching honesty and deep commitment. It also requires bravery and imagination – unlike opera, there is no director to tell you what to do and no costume or set to aid the performance.

Over the years, we have seen how many singers and pianists have formed fruitful musical partnerships during our Artist Programme. To help these duos to flourish, whilst also encouraging innovation in the performance of artsong, we are launching Samling and Song, a residency programme in partnership with Marchmont Makers Foundation.

We are inviting Samling Artist singer and pianist duos to develop, promote and perform art song recital programmes.

Applicants will be asked to show that they have plans to perform their programme in UK venues outside London, and we are looking for imaginative proposals that present repertoire in new ways or in unusual spaces, engage with other art forms or introduce music by underrepresented groups.

Two duos will be selected each year for a fully-funded residential week on Marchmont Estate where they can take inspiration from both the beautiful natural environment and art collection and from Marchmont's thriving community of visual artists. They will also be offered mentoring in all aspects of their project, from planning through to performance.

Man, Woman, Child at Marchmont

Our Academy Singers took to the high seas for this year's summer concert project with tales of sailors, magical sea creatures and the simple pleasures of a day at the seaside.

The semi-staged production of song and poetry was directed by Samling Artists Miranda Wright and pianist Jo Ramadan, and lighting director Alex Edwards created maritime visual effects for the performances at Saltburn Arts and Sage Gateshead. During an extended rehearsal period, our Academy Singers were able to develop the skills they had previously worked on with our leaders, introducing movement, acting, props and spoken word to their performances.


